2.0 PURPOSE

ASSESSMENT

a. INITIAL ASSESSMENT

All City personnel will assess the effects of the incident on themselves, their co-workers, facilities and equipment, and other areas under their responsibility. They will pass this initial assessment information up the chain of command to their Department Operations Centers (DOC) where it will then be collated and passed on to the Emergency Coordination Center (ECC).

Damage assessments and situation reports are created and given to the ECC which compiles the reports and forwards them on to the County and the State ECCs.

Critical documents used for reporting the incident include City Facility Reports and Situation Reports (SitReps). Other reports may also be required depending on the type of incident and whether it is proclaimed by local, state or federal authorities.

5.2 Thorough Assessment of Damage at Fire Department Facilities:
