- 4. Patients with life threatening conditions or symptoms (e.g., airway obstruction, cardiac arrest, anaphylaxis, etc.) should be transported directly to the nearest hospital.
- 5. If a patient's condition is stable and he/she is requesting transport to a hospital that is farther away the ambulance may honor that request under the following conditions:
  - Medical control or medical direction has concurred.
  - Additional transport time will not adversely affect the patient's condition.
  - The patient has been advised and understands that insurance may not cover the additional expense of a longer transport.
  - Weather and road conditions are acceptable.
  - The additional transport time will not place the service area uncovered for an unreasonable amount of time.

6. When the difference in estimated transport times to more than one hospital is less than ten minutes, the hospitals may be presumed to be of equal transport distance.
