If history, symptoms, or signs of head injuries are present, suspect a spinal injury and manually immobilize the head and neck while maintaining a patent airway using a modified jaw thrust. Take full spinal immobilization precautions following initial stabilization.

- 1. Baseline care standards.
- 2. Use appropriate spinal immobilization procedures.
- 3. Administer oxygen at 15L per minute via non-rebreather mask.
- 4. Maintain airway per protocol.
- 5. Transport to trauma center as soon as possible. Call for ALS and/or helicopter intercept.
- 6. Hyperventilate if the following symptoms are found:
 - GCS < 9
 - SPO2 < 90%
 - Persistent seizures
 - Pupils non-reactive, asymmetric, or dilated.
- 7. Open wounds which expose the brain tissue should be covered with saline-soaked gauze.
- 8. If patient is combative, check airway to ensure adequate ventilation and respiration. Physically restrain as needed per protocol.
- 9. Re-evaluate GCS, level of consciousness, and circulatory, motor and sensory status frequently.
